Old Testament Lesson

Does it ever seem to you that most sins just aren't that big of a deal? People commit sins all the time and God doesn't seem to do anything about it. In fact, we're so used to being surrounded by sin, many sins don't bother us anymore. Think of how often we witness people ignoring or despising God? We hear language that dishonors God, or behavior that mocks the sanctity of marriage. It is becoming more and more common to ignore God's command to gather in worship.

How much of it still bothers us? Could part of the problem be that we get used to sin? Could it be that there are things that are just more important to us that our Creator and our Savior? Maybe we see sins either as big and horrible (murder, rape, or something done against us), or as small and insignificant (white lies, thoughts, or our own sins)? That would make us the judge instead of God.

God warns us through the prophet Joel that there will be a reckoning. Every nation—every person—will have to account for their sins when God comes in judgment. Consider the power and the finality of the language God uses: swing sickle, trample the grapes, stars are snuffed out. Heaven and earth will tremble and everyone will stand under God's irrevocable and eternal judgment.

"But the LORD will be a refuge for his people." Jesus Christ, our Savior, is indispensable. With him, we have forgiveness and life. Without him, we are lost. Let's stay close; the Day is coming.

Joel 3:12-16 (EHV)

¹²Let the nations be roused.

Let them advance into the Valley of Jehoshaphat,

for there I will be seated to judge all the nations.

¹³Swing the sickle,

for the harvest is ripe.

Come, trample the grapes,

for the winepress is full and the vats overflow,

because the nations' wickedness is so great!

¹⁴Multitudes, multitudes in the Valley of Decision!

For the Day of the LORD is near in the Valley of Decision.

Gospel Lesson

When you read the parable of the Weeds and the Wheat, do you see yourself as a weed or as wheat? Nobody wants to see themselves as a weed. We like to see ourselves as good people.

Notice how Jesus describes the weeds in verse 41: "everything that causes sin and those who continue to break the law." That's a pretty good description of you and me—of everyone. The scary part of living the field is that wheat can turn into weeds. The breathtaking part is that God can turn weeds into wheat. It's a matter of faith. The wheat grows in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ (2 Peter 3:18). The weeds keep breaking the law and encourage others to do the same. Which best describes you on any given day?

Jesus is the only one who can make wheat, sustain it, and make it grow. The enemy is sowing weeds to try to destroy that.

Jesus is warning anyone who will listen that there will be an accounting. A day is coming when Jesus will send out his angels to pull out the weeds. They will be thrown into the fiery furnace. Do you know of anyone who will face judgment without Jesus?

We want to live as wheat and we pray that God will protect our faith and make us grow. We also pray that God will miraculously change more and more weeds into wheat, so that our friends, our neighbors, and every soul on earth can be saved on the great day of Judgment.

Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43 (EHV)

²⁴He presented another parable to them: "The kingdom of heaven is like a man who sowed good seed in his field. ²⁵But while people were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat and went away. ²⁶When the plants sprouted and produced heads of grain, the weeds also appeared. ²⁷The servants of the owner came and said to him, 'Sir, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where did the weeds come from?' ²⁸He said to them, 'An enemy did this.' The servants asked him, 'Do you want us to go and gather up the weeds?' ²⁹'No,' he answered, 'because when you gather up the weeds, you might pull up the wheat along with them. ³⁰Let both grow together until the harvest, and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, "First, gather up the weeds, bind them in bundles, and burn them. Then, gather the wheat into my barn."""

³⁶Then Jesus sent the people away and went into the house. His disciples came to him and said, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds in the field."

³⁷He answered them, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man. ³⁸The field is the world. The good seeds are the sons of the kingdom. The weeds are the sons of the Evil One. ³⁹The enemy who sowed them is the Devil. The harvest is the end of the world. The reapers are angels. ⁴⁰Therefore, just as the weeds are gathered up and burned with fire, so it will be at the end of the world. ⁴¹The Son of Man will send out his angels, and they will pull out of his kingdom everything that causes sin and those who continue to break the law. ⁴²The angels will throw them into the fiery furnace where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. ⁴³Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Whoever has ears to hear, let him hear.

Sermon - Christians Walk Away from Sin

People are confusing. You'd think that, after experiencing the consequences of sin, we'd be done with it. So why do we go back?

I think part of it is that sin does provide a temporary, immediate gratification. We can't see tomorrow, so it's difficult to see the big picture. We don't always know what's best for us, so we can be tempted by the empty promises of sin. When we look at the list of sins in verse 3, we can see how familiar and how treacherous those behaviors are.

That's why Jesus tells us to arm ourselves with his mindset—so we don't get lost in sinful desires. Jesus suffered to free us from slavery to sin. He died so that we can live for God's will instead. Sin brings pain and addiction and death. God's will brings healing and freedom and life.

People are surprised when we don't join them in sin. Sin is so familiar, so common, and so defended, that to many people it seems normal—even good. When we reject sin, we take the very real chance that sinners will reject us. God tells us through Peter that we can expect people to insult us and to vilify us for rejecting the sins they have chosen.

But we know the big picture. We know that sin is polluting this world and destroying lives. We know that Jesus paid with his life to bring freedom and forgiveness. And we know that everyone will have to give an account to the Judge of the living and the dead.

So, we preach the Gospel, both in words and in actions. We bring the only hope this sinful world has. It's our nature to keep going back to sin. It's God's nature to keep offering forgiveness. By faith, we strive to live according to God's will. By grace, we're forgiven when we fall. Through the scriptures we grow in faith and offer life to a world trapped in sin.

1st Peter 4:1-8

¹Therefore, because Christ suffered in flesh, arm yourselves with the same mindset, because the one who has suffered in flesh is done with sin. ²Do this so that you no longer live the rest of your time in the flesh for human desires but for God's will. ³Indeed, you have already spent enough time in the past doing what the Gentiles want to do: living in unbridled immorality, lusts, drunkenness, orgies, drinking parties, and disgusting idolatry.

⁴For this reason, they are surprised that you do not plunge into the same overflowing river of filth with them, and they slander you. ⁵They will have to give an account to the one who is ready to judge the living and the dead. ⁶In fact, it was for this reason that the gospel was preached also to those who are dead, so that they might be judged the way people are judged in flesh and that they might live the way God lives in spirit.

⁷The end of all things is near. So have sound judgment and be self-controlled for the sake of your prayers. ⁸Above all, love each other constantly, because love covers a multitude of sins.
