Old Testament Lesson

What Is God Doing?

In Ezekiel 37, God gives us some vivid pictures of what he does. The first half of the chapter shows his giving life. The second half shows his fixing it when we break it.

God tells Ezekiel to use an object lesson. He joined two sticks together to make them one. In that object lesson God illustrated how he would fix what his people had broken. At first glance, it seems that what God is going to fix is the political fracture between the northern and southern tribes of Israel. But the description doesn't support that thought. God's promise to make them one nation under one king doesn't match any historical state of Israel. Neither does the description of the people. The people in this healed nation will never break the first commandment or indulge in any sinful practice. That doesn't fit any earthly group of people.

God is describing how he would redeem the whole world and bring us into his kingdom. We are called from everywhere on the planet, cleansed of our sin, we are made God's people, and we follow our Good Shepherd. We live in his kingdom forever under God's covenant of peace.

It is always amazing to see God's love in action. He reaches out to sinful, broken people and heals them. He repairs the relationship that we broke and brings us back into his family.

In this chapter, notice how many times God says he will act. He brings, gathers, makes one, saves, cleanses, makes a covenant, establishes, and multiplies his people. God's kingdom is more about what God does than what we do. On Saints Triumphant Sunday, we celebrate God's power on our behalf. Our triumph rests solely and securely in God's almighty power. In the last four verses, God uses the word "forever" four times to describe the coming kingdom. It will be a kingdom without divisions (one stick, one nation, one king, one shepherd—forever). Heaven is our final home of triumph!

We may not think of heaven that often, but it is home. It is ours. And it is forever.

Ezekiel 37:15-28 (EHV)

¹⁵ The word of the LORD came to me.

¹⁶ Now you, son of man, take one piece of wood and write on it: "Belonging to Judah and belonging to the people of Israel associated with him." Then take another piece of wood and write on it: "Belonging to Joseph, Ephraim's piece of wood, and the whole house of Israel associated with him." ¹⁷ Then hold one piece of wood close to the other to make a single board for yourself, so that they are one in your hand.

¹⁸ When your countrymen say to you, "Won't you tell us what you mean by these things?" ¹⁹ you tell them, "This is what the LORD God says. I am going to take the piece of wood which is in the hand of Ephraim, which is for Joseph and for the tribes of Israel associated with him, and I will attach it to the piece of wood for Judah. In this way I will make them one board, so that they will be one in my hand." ²⁰ The boards on which you will write should be in your hand in front of their eyes.

²¹ Then say this to them. This is what the LORD God says. I am going to take the people of Israel from among the nations where they have gone, and I will gather them from all around, and I will bring them to their own land. ²² I will make them one nation in the land, on the mountains of Israel, and one king will be king for all of them. Never again will they be two nations, and never again will they be divided into two kingdoms. ²³ Never again will they defile themselves with their filthy idols, with their disgusting practices, and with all their rebellious actions. I will save them from all their backsliding by which they have sinned, and I will cleanse them. They will be my people, and I will be their God.

²⁴ My servant David will be King over them, and they will all have one Shepherd. They will follow my ordinances and be conscientious about keeping my statutes. ²⁵ They will live on the land I gave my servant Jacob, where your fathers lived. They will live there permanently—they, their children, and their grandchildren—and my servant David will be their prince forever. ²⁶ I will make a covenant of peace with them. It will be an everlasting covenant with them. I will establish them, and I will multiply them and set my sanctuary in their midst forever. ²⁷ My Dwelling Place will be over them. I will be their God, and they will be my people. ²⁸ Then the nations will know that I, the LORD, make Israel holy when my holy place is in their midst forever.

Gospel Lesson

Are You Ready?

When we read the parable of the Ten Virgins, which group do you see yourself in? The group that was ready? They had oil in their lamps and in reserve. That's wise. And it's how we like to see ourselves.

It is wise to consider what is different between the two groups – and what is not. This is not a comparison between believers and unbelievers—Jesus is talking to his church! There are two main comparisons between the believers.

- 1. The wise were prepared for the long haul. They brought extra oil. The unwise weren't ready for that. Jesus' suggests that Judgment Day will take longer than we might think. "The bridegroom was delayed." And "they all became drowsy and fell asleep." The wise are ready for faithful perseverance. That means that we are ready for a lifetime of service and sacrifice, not a short ride on a wave of positive emotion.
- 2. The wise went in to enjoy the banquet and the foolish were shut out. It reminds us of Jesus' warning at the close of his Sermon on the Mount: "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, ... I will tell them plainly, 'I never knew you. Away from me, you evildoers!'" (Mt. 7:21-23) The consequences of not being ready are enormous. It's tragic when someone wanders from the faith and experiences the pain and frustration of sin. It's epic disaster for anyone not be ready on Judgment Day!

Keep watch! Those words are laden with the love and concern of our Good Shepherd, who gave his life for us! "Keep watch, because you do not know the day or the hour."

Matthew 25:1-13 (EHV)

"At that time the kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. ² Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. ³ When the foolish ones took their lamps, they did not take any oil with them; ⁴ but the wise took oil in their containers with their lamps. ⁵ While the bridegroom was delayed, they all became drowsy and fell asleep. ⁶ But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look, the bridegroom! Come out to meet him!' ⁷ Then all those virgins got up and trimmed their lamps. ⁸ The foolish ones said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil because our lamps are going out.' ⁹ But the wise answered, 'No, there may not be enough for us and for you. Instead, go to those who sell oil and buy some for yourselves.' ¹⁰ But while they were away buying oil, the bridegroom came. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding banquet, and the door was shut. ¹¹ Later, the other virgins also came and said, 'Lord, Lord, let us in.' ¹² But he answered, 'Amen I tell you: I do not know you.' ¹³ Therefore, keep watch, because you do not know the day or the hour.

Epistle Lesson/Sermon Text:

Victory Celebration

In Revelation 19, God gives us a glimpse into the halls of heaven to see the victory that waits for us there.

In heaven, we hear the saints and angels cry, "Hallelujah!" George Handel tried to capture the glory of what John witnessed with his Hallelujah Chorus. His work is inspiring and majestic. It is one of the greatest works of music this side of heaven, but not even his masterpiece can match that distant triumph song.

Through John's vision, God lets us see behind the door that was shut in the parable of the Ten Virgins (our Gospel for this Sunday). He shows us the thunderous praise of the immense congregation in heaven.

By God's grace, we will be in that crowd. Our voices will praise our God and celebrate the wedding of the Lamb. It's our congregation! It's our place! It's our eternal home! We and the entire Christian Church are the Bride, washed clean of all sin and guilt.

Blessed are they who are called to the marriage feast of the Lamb! Let us celebrate with all our heart today. And we pray that God will keep us watchful for our coming triumph!

Revelation 19:1-9 (EHV)

After these things I heard what seemed to be the loud sound of an immense crowd in heaven, saying:

Alleluia!

Salvation and glory and power belong to our God,

² for his judgments are true and just,

because he has condemned the great prostitute who corrupted the earth with her immorality,

and he has avenged his servants' blood that was shed by her hand.

- ³ A second time they said, "Alleluia! Her smoke goes up forever and ever."
- ⁴ Then the twenty-four elders and the four living creatures bowed down and worshipped God, who sits on the throne, saying, "Amen! Alleluia!"
- ⁵ And from the throne came a voice that said, "Praise our God, all you his servants and you who fear him, small and great."
- ⁶ And I heard what seemed to be the roar of a large crowd or the roar of many waters or the sound of loud rumblings of thunder, saying:

Alleluia!

For the Lord our God, the Almighty, reigns.

⁷Let us rejoice and be glad and give him glory,

because the wedding of the Lamb has come.

His bride has made herself ready,

⁸ and she was given bright, clean, fine linen to wear.

(In fact, the fine linen is the "not guilty" verdicts pronounced on the saints.)

9 The angel said to me, "Write: Blessed are those who are invited to the wedding supper of the Lamb." He also said to me, "These are the true words of God."
