Old Testament Lesson

Sometimes life is good. Sometimes it's rough. Sometimes it's epic, soul-crushing disaster. When we read the book of Job, his suffering and his misery are proverbial. His words in chapter seven reveal how oppressive his days are and how deep his despair. His days grind him down and he finds no relief, not even in sleep.

There is only one ray of hope in his darkness; only one slender thread that keeps him from sliding into the Stygian abyss: he can pray. His prayers are dark and his hope is dim, but his prayers reach all the way into the throne room of heaven. There is power there. Our heavenly Father is there. And he loves us. He hears us. He cares for us. And he acts.

Let's remember that the important part of our prayers is not our words, our attitude, or even our faith—it's the One Who Hears and Answers us. God heard Job and delivered him from darkness and despair. God hears us, too. He watches over us, cares for us, hears us, delivers us, and keeps us close to his side from here to the halls of heaven.

Life can be rough, but we're never alone. Even when can't see him, God is here. He walks with us even in the valley of the shadow of death.

Job 7:1-7 (EHV)

Isn't man's time on earth like being compelled to serve in the army? Aren't his days like those of a hired man?

²Like a slave, he longs for shade,

or like a day laborer, he waits for his pay.

³ In the same way, I have been allotted months of futility, and nights of agony have been assigned to me.

⁴ When I lie down, I think, "How long before I get up?"

But the night drags on,

and I am filled with restlessness until dawn.

⁵ My flesh is clothed with maggots and caked with dirt.

My skin scabs over and then oozes again.

⁶ My days pass by more swiftly than the shuttle of a weaver's loom. They come to an end without hope.

⁷Remember that my life is just a breath.

My eyes will never again see good fortune.

Gospel Lesson

Our Gospel lesson reveals the power and the love of Christ. Look at all the problems that are listed. Everybody in town seemed to have trouble or sickness or demon possession. But every one of the problems was a blessing in disguise—each problem provided people a reason to despair of their own abilities and to look to Jesus, the compassionate and merciful Savior. Each problem was another chance to witness the glory of God.

Notice Peter's mother-in-law's faith-inspired response to God's grace: she was moved to thank God by serving him among his people. Our sufferings, too, spur us to seek God in prayer. His grace moves us to thankful service.

Notice, too, that Jesus' eyes were always in two directions at the same time: down to care for us and to save us in our need, and up to do everything as an act of worship and obedience to his Father.

Jesus prayed. Then he went on to proclaim the gospel and continue his work of rescuing people from the devil.

Mark 1:29-39 (EHV)

²⁹ They left the synagogue and went with James and John to the home of Simon and Andrew. ³⁰ Simon's mother-in-law was lying in bed, sick with a fever. Without delay they told Jesus about her. ³¹ He went to her, took her by the hand, and raised her up. The fever left her, and she began to serve them. ³² That evening, when the sun had set, the people kept bringing to him all who were sick and demon-possessed. ³³ The whole town gathered at the door. ³⁴ He healed many people who were sick with various diseases and drove out many demons. But he did not allow the demons to speak, because they knew who he was.

³⁵ Jesus got up early in the morning, while it was still dark, and went out. He withdrew to a solitary place and was praying there. ³⁶ Simon and his companions searched for him, ³⁷ and, when they found him, they said to him, "Everyone is looking for you!"

³⁸ He told them, "Let's go somewhere else, to the neighboring villages, so that I can preach there too. In fact, that is why I have come." ³⁹ Then he went throughout the whole region of Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and driving out demons.

Epistle Lesson/Sermon Text:

Romans chapter 8 contains some of the most comforting promises in all of Scripture. "There is no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus" (v.1). The Holy Spirit testifies that we are God's children (v.17). The Holy Spirit prays for us when we don't know what to pray (v.26). Jesus is interceding for us at God's right hand (v.35). Nothing can separate us from the love of God (vv.38-39).

Perhaps the greatest of the promises, especially in hard times, is verse 28: God is working everything together for our good.

It is easy to see God's gracious will when life is going well. It takes faith to see it in hardship. God promises that in both the good times and the bad, he is working for our good. In Job's suffering, God was at work, strengthening, teaching, and keeping him close. When Daniel or Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego were convicted as criminals, God worked it for their good and for his glory. When the Christian church was persecuted, God blessed them in it and used it to save souls.

Now the promise is ours. God promises us that, in all things, he is molding us into the image of his Son. A change that profound, is bound to hurt some.

Romans 8:28-30 (EHV)

²⁸ We know that all things work together for the good of those who love God, for those who are called according to his purpose, ²⁹ because those God foreknew, he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, so that he would be the firstborn among many brothers. ³⁰ And those he predestined, he also called. Those he called, he also justified. And those he justified, he also glorified.
